



*Candles.* Candle ceremonies are impressive. The color of the candles can have special significance. Candle holders can be made from wood, plaster, metal, etc. Logs or log slices can also be used as candle holders.

*Indian headdress.* These are sometimes difficult and time-consuming to make, but most Scoutmasters will think it worth the effort. With careful storage, a headdress will last for years. Transferring the headdress from the outgoing Scoutmaster to the incoming leader is a beautiful act. The headdress alone, worn with the Scout uniform, is adequate unless you wish to make other Indian costume parts. Navy enlisted white uniforms (purchased at a surplus store) can be dyed tan or brown for a good Indian costume.

*Costumes.* Occasionally, the Scoutmaster may want to wear a costume fitting the monthly theme. You won't want to do this every month, of course, but on special occasions it can be very effective.

*Campfire.* A log cabin or teepee-type fire can be nailed to a plywood base and lined with yellow, orange, or red cellophane. Use a small string of individually blinking Christmas lights underneath. Be sure to use flame-proof materials.

*Bridge to Scouting.* A bridge can be built from logs or scrap lumber, using dowling for poles and white rope to string along the top. Graduating Webelos Scouts look forward to crossing the bridge and being met by the Scoutmaster of the troop they are joining. It is a good idea to build the bridge so that the poles can be removed for easy storage.

*Arrow of Light.* This can be cut from scrap plywood, painted yellow, and mounted atop another piece of plywood for the base. Holes can be drilled to hold candles.
